#### Pigment and Gilding Demonstrators



Rian Kanduth is a graduate of Conservation from City & Guilds London Art School. Since graduating, Rian has specialised in all aspects of Gilding, working for English Heritage, The National Trust, the V&A Museum, Seven Dials, and Chateau De Moncla as well as a portfolio of private individuals. Rian is a Brother of the Art Workers Guild, and member of SOG, ICON and MA.



Tuesday Riddell holds a BA (Hons) in Fine Art from City & Guilds of London Art School and is this year's Painter-Stainer's Decorative Surface Fellow at the Art School. She produces luscious and intriguing works that explore attitudes to nature and artifice. Tuesday holds an enduring fascination with japanning, a 17th century form of lacquering included on the Radcliffe Red List of Endangered Crafts and is interested in in exploring its place in the contemporary landscape.

Her work was recently exhibited at Viktor Wynd's Museum of Curiosities and she has an upcoming group show with Subsidiary Projects.



Catalina Christensen has a Fine Art Degree from City & Guilds of London Art School. Her hands-on approach to pigment collection and preparation, together with the use of traditional egg tempera techniques, blend to produce a distinctive visual style, through which her thematic concerns are explored. Christensen's practice progresses from micro to macro level, from processing the natural pigments to the creation of works, which call up distant memories of the artist in remote landscapes.



Jane de Sausmarez graduated from Central St Martins having studied printed textiles. She has been obsessed with colour since she saw oil in a puddle at the age of four. Jane has taught colour theory and practice in various art schools including at the City & Guilds of London Art School. Jane is the author of the book 'Basic Colour: a Practical Handbook', and for over fifteen years has given talks and intensive colour workshops internationally including at the National Gallery.
